MOTION: Hudkins moved and Steinman seconded approval of the minutes of the Board of Commissioners meeting dated May 30, 2000. Campbell, Hudkins, Heier, Workman and Steinman voted aye. Motion carried.

2) <u>CLAIMS:</u> Approval of all claims processed through Tuesday, June 6, 2000.

**MOTION:** Workman moved and Steinman seconded approval. Heier, Campbell, Steinman, Hudkins and Workman voted aye. Motion carried.

## 3) **SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS**:

- A. The Commissioners Award of Excellence was presented to Pam Branson with the Lancaster County Extension Office.
- B. A resolution proclaiming the week of June 5<sup>th</sup> through June 9<sup>th</sup>, 2000 as "Management Week." (R-00-65)

The Chair read Resolution 00-65 into the record.

Terri Storer, City Attorney's Office, and Deb Nerud, City Libraries appeared and thanked the County Board for their support on behalf of Leadership Link.

**MOTION:** Hudkins moved and Heier seconded approval of Resolution 00-65. Workman, Hudkins, Campbell, Steinman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried.

# C. Reappointment of Jim Cada to the Veterans Service Committee for a five year term, commencing July 1, 2000 and ending June 30, 2005.

Gary Chalupa, Veterans Service Officer, appeared and introduced Jim Cada to the County Board.

He explained that the Veterans Service Committee consists of five volunteers who govern the administration of benefits and the manner in which business is conducted in the Veterans Service Office.

MOTION:

Steinman moved and Heier seconded approval of the reappointment of Jim Cada to the Veterans Service Committee for a five year term, commencing July 1, 2000 and ending June 30, 2005. Workman, Hudkins, Campbell, Steinman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried.

## 4) PUBLIC HEARINGS:

County Board of Zoning Appeals, Appeal 112, requested by Larry and Dale Heitbrink for a variance of the rear yard setback from 50 feet to 21.1 feet, on property generally located east of Northwest 126<sup>th</sup> Street on the north side of Highway 34 and West Alvo Road in Lancaster County, Nebraska.

The Chair opened the public hearing and asked Mike DeKalb, Planning Department, for a brief review of Appeal 112.

The Clerk administered the oath to Mike DeKalb, Planning Department.

DeKalb reported that the applicant had requested an Administrative Subdivision to split off the farm house to a parcel consisting of 3.017 acres. The variance, he said, will allow the applicant to keep the buildings with the farm. DeKalb indicated a recommendation of approval from the County Board of Zoning Appeals because it is an unusual circumstance based on the structures and layout.

The Clerk administered the oath to Larry Heitbrink, applicant.

Heitbrink stated that he intends on selling the house to his son. He said there is a dairy on the remaining property that he and his brother would continue to operate.

The Chair asked if anyone wished to testify in opposition of Appeal 112.

No one appeared and the hearing was closed.

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Heier seconded approval of County Board of Zoning Appeal, Appeal 112. Hudkins, Steinman, Workman, Heier and Campbell voted aye.

Motion carried.

## 5) **OLD BUSINESS**:

A. An addendum to a contract, executed June 1, 1999, with Marsh USA Inc. for consulting services with regard to benefits plans. The addendum provides for a ten percent increase in Marsh USA Inc. fees beginning June 1, 2000 through May 31, 2001. (C-00-253)

**MOTION:** Steinman moved and Workman seconded approval. Steinman, Workman, Campbell, Hudkins and Heier voted aye. Motion carried.

B. An interlocal agreement with the City of Lincoln regarding the use of wastewater residual on crop land. The County will provide administrative support and education and the City will provide transport and disposal of biosolids and financial support. The agreement may be terminated by either party giving six months notice. (C-00-137)

**MOTION:** Steinman moved and Heier seconded approval. Heier, Workman, Hudkins, Campbell and Steinman voted aye. Motion carried.

## 6) **NEW BUSINESS**:

A. An application for a Special Designated License from Crooked Creek Golf Club, located at 134<sup>th</sup> and "O" Streets, to hold a golfing event on Sunday, June 11, 2000 from 8 a.m. to Noon.

Steinman asked if the Sheriff's Office had a recommendation.

Terry Wagner, Sheriff, appeared and indicated they had no reason for denial.

**MOTION:** Steinman moved and Heier seconded approval. Campbell, Steinman, Workman, Heier and Hudkins voted aye. Motion carried.

- B. Agreements for the Families First and Foremost pilot program to collect data and information and provide follow-up services for children with whom the contractor comes in contact. The County will pay the following contractors \$7,500 for their respective month of service:
  - \* Child Guidance, beginning June 1, 2000 and ending June 30, 2000 (C-00-285)
  - \* Cedars Youth Services, beginning August 1, 2000 and ending August 31, 2000 (C-00-284)

**MOTION:** Hudkins moved and Steinman seconded approval. Heier, Workman, Steinman, Campbell and Hudkins voted aye. Motion carried.

C. An agreement with Nebraska Mental Health Center for professional services to provide complete evaluation and recommendations for treatment planning services to youth identified by the Office of Juvenile Services and Juvenile Court, beginning April 20, 2000 and ending July 1, 2000. The County will pay \$1,500 per evaluation. (C-00-283)

Dave Johnson, Deputy County Attorney, stated if the County Board moves approval of the agreement it should be subject to receiving signed originals and also subject to receiving a signed addendum specifying that Dr. Nessetti conducts the evaluations.

- MOTION: Steinman moved and Heier seconded approval of the agreement subject to receiving signed originals and also subject to receiving a signed addendum specifying that Dr. Nessetti conducts the evaluations. Steinman, Hudkins, Heier, Workman and Campbell voted aye. Motion carried.
  - D. A resolution amending resolution R-00-62 to include Human Services in the transfer of appropriations, in the amount of \$5,896, from the General Fund Miscellaneous Budget to various General Fund Agencies. (R-00-64)

**MOTION:** Workman moved and Steinman seconded approval of Resolution 00-62. Workman, Campbell, Hudkins, Steinman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried.

E. A resolution defining ambulance services needs for Lancaster County, Nebraska. (R-00-66)

Campbell stated the County Board received a letter in April, which included a sample resolution, from the Lancaster County Medical Society putting forth proposals regarding ambulance service needs. Since that time, she stated, the County Board has spent time at every staff meeting, over the course of the past six to eight weeks, inviting individuals to visit with the Board to provide them with education on the issue.

She explained that the provision of ambulance service currently is performed in conjunction with 17 rural fire districts who have worked together through the Mutual Aid Society. In researching the issue, Campbell stated, the County Board discovered that there was no contract between Rural Metro, any of the 17 rural fire districts or the Mutual Aid Society. At that point, the Board felt they should articulate some of the principles pertinent to the community and a resolution was drafted.

Campbell read Resolution 00-66 into the record.

Campbell stated she had been asked a question by the Southwest Rural Fire District about the fact that they have their own ambulances and a medical director in place.

She stated her response was that the differences, in terms of ownership of ambulances or medical director retention, would probably be outlined in the contract between the provider and the Mutual Aid Society.

Workman stated that he supports the resolution and commented that the Mayor and City Council have been very receptive to the County Board's comments and requests. He said he feels confident that they will choose a provider in the best interest of the rural residents as well as the residents of the City.

Natalie Olson, Executive Director of the Lancaster County Medical Society, appeared and asked that Item 3 of the resolution be clarified and suggested the following language, "The entire pre-hospital emergency medical care system should be subject to independent medical oversight".

Kerry Eagan, Chief Administrative Officer, indicated that was the intent of the County Board.

MOTION: Steinman moved and Hudkins seconded approval of Resolution 00-66 subject to the inclusion of the following language on Item 3, "The pre-hospital emergency medical care system should be subject to independent medical oversight".

Mike Morosin, past president of the Malone Neighborhood Association, thanked the County Board for their time on the matter.
