The location announcement of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act was given and the meeting was called to order at 9:35 a.m.

1) <u>MINUTES:</u> Approval of the Minutes of the Board of Commissioners meeting held on Tuesday, July 28, 2009.

MOTION: Stevens moved and Schorr seconded approval of the minutes. Hudkins, Stevens, Schorr and Heier voted aye. Workman abstained. Motion carried 4-0.

2) CLAIMS: Approval of all claims processed through Tuesday, August 4, 2009.

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Stevens seconded approval of the claims. Schorr, Hudkins, Workman, Stevens and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

3) **SPECIAL PRESENTATION:**

A. Funding and development of the prevention system within Region V, the State Epidemiological Workgroup, Southeast Nebraska and Drug Advisory Boards and acknowledgment of the local coalition and Youth Action Board (YAB) members – Sandy Morrissey, Director of Regional Prevention Coordination (RPC)

Sandy Morrissey distributed a handout (Exhibit A). She discussed the Federal block grant funding for Region V, which showed Lancaster County receiving \$140,400 for 2009-2010. Morrissey discussed National Outcome Measures (Exhibit A), which are required by the federal government to show changes and effectiveness of their strategies.

3) **SPECIAL PRESENTATION CONTINUED:**

Morrissey said a video on drinking has been put together with Nebraska Educational Television (NET); the video airs periodically and is also available on DVD.

Schorr asked about youth involvement. Morrissey discussed the Regional Youth Action Board and their activities, including June Jam and the drug free pledge started by Tom Osborne, which Bo Pellini has continued.

Hudkins spoke of the importance of Morrissey's work. He noted law enforcement has said 70-75% of their calls are alcohol related.

Morrissey talked about a statewide project in which law enforcement is sending a letter to graduating seniors' parents on keeping kids safe against alcohol at graduation.

4) **NEW BUSINESS:**

An application for a Special Events Permit from Benson Enterprises, Inc., located at 5600 SW 140th Street, Denton, Lancaster County, Nebraska, to operate a corn maze from September 25, 2009, to November 1, 2009. Days and hours of operation will vary.

Wayne Benson discussed the corn maze and the Verizon theme. He said he would like to submit an official letter on the corn maze for the world record, and he asked for assistance from the Board.

MOTION: Hudkins moved to authorize the Chair to sign a letter in support of the corn maze and to ask the Visitors Promotion Committee to also send a support letter. Workman seconded with the addition of having the letter drafted in the County Board Office and for signature by all five Commissioners.

Benson noted their community work with the Food Bank, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Army and National Guard.

ROLL CALL: Schorr, Stevens, Hudkins, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

MOTION: Schorr moved and Hudkins seconded approval of the Special Events Permit application. Schorr, Stevens, Hudkins, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

The Chair announced Item 4D would be discussed next.

D. A resolution in the matter of approving the 2009-2010 annual cost of living increase for unrepresented classified County employees in the amount of two percent (2%) for employees in the "C" and "E" classifications, and three and a quarter percent (3.25%) for employees in the "X" classification, effective the pay period beginning August 13, 2009. (R-09-0055)

Gary Lacey, County Attorney, announced Larry the Cable Guy would be giving the Child Advocacy Center \$1,000,000 to help fund a new building; it would be co-located with the Lincoln Police Department and the Department of Health and Human Services Child Protection Division in University Place.

Lacey expressed his concern over unequal pay raises with respect to "C" and "E" class employees. He encouraged the Board to grant the same raises (3.25%) to these classifications.

Dennis Keefe, Public Defender, noted some of these employees are the lowest paid in his office and do the very same work as those receiving a 3.25% raise. Keefe added that in past years, he thought the Board treated these employees the same with a few exceptions with regard to cost of living raises.

Hudkins said the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the region showed 1.9%, which was the basis for the 2% raise.

Dennis Meyer, Budget and Fiscal Officer, said he would have to review the numbers to know how much difference there would be between 2% and 3.25%.

Stevens noted a three-year labor contract was negotiated with the American Federation of State, County & Municipal Employees (AFSCME) a year ago. He felt a 2% increase for the "C" and "E" classes would be justified due to the current economic situation.

The consensus was to continue the discussion at the staff meeting on Thursday, August 6, and to hold the resolution for the next County Board meeting.

John Cripe, Compensation and Pay Manager, appeared and presented figures on the salary percentage difference. He said a 1% value on "C" employees would equal around \$200,000 for 285 people, and a 1% value on "E" employees would equal around \$30,000 for 60 people.

B. A resolution authorizing the installation of a driveway left warning sign on S. 120th Street 500 feet north of 16758 S. 120th Street for southbound traffic. (R-09-0053)

MOTION: Stevens moved and Schorr seconded approval of the resolution. Stevens, Workman, Schorr, Hudkins and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

C. A resolution in the matter of authorizing the use of County Visitors Improvement Fund proceeds for Visitor Promotion. (R-09-0054)

MOTION: Schorr moved and Workman seconded approval of the resolution. Workman, Schorr, Hudkins, Stevens and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

- D. Item moved forward on agenda.
- E. A resolution in the matter of adopting a scale of wages for job classifications covered by the 2008-2011 agreement between the County of Lancaster and Local 2468 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees AFL-CIO (AFSCME); specifically, for the pay period beginning August 13, 2009, and shall remain in effect until the beginning of the first pay period in August, 2010. (R-09-0056)

MOTION: Stevens moved and Hudkins seconded approval of the resolution. Hudkins, Stevens, Schorr, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

F. A resolution approving a project for Plastics Companies Enterprises, Inc., a Texas Corporation, and determining the intent of the County of Lancaster to issue its Industrial Development Revenue Bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$2,000,000 to finance the costs of such project, and related matters. (R-09-0057)

Paul Almburg, President of HTI Plastics, a division of Plastic Company Enterprises, gave a review of the company. He said HTI Plastics has seen dramatic growth over the past few years and needs to add 35,000 sq ft of manufacturing space and more equipment. Almburg said they have 80 employees and would like to add another 20 employees over the next two to three years. He asked for approval of the bond so they can continue their growth.

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Workman seconded approval of the resolution.

Schorr requested a tour of the facility be arranged for the County Board.

Workman asked what their company made. Wallenberg said HTI Plastics is an injection molding company with 50% of revenue coming from pharmaceutical products, Class 1 devices and applicators. The other 50% is broken down into various commercial items, such as sporting goods and food packaging.

ROLL CALL: Hudkins, Stevens, Schorr, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

G. An agreement with Cynthia D. Petersen for professional services of a nurse practitioner to assist in the provision of psychiatric services at the Community Mental Health Center. Term of the agreement is July 1, 2009, through June 30, 2010. The County will pay \$60 per hour for no more than eight hours per week. A business associate agreement is also attached to the agreement to comply with Health Insurance Portability & Accountability Act (HIPAA) regulations. (C-09-0413)

The County Attorney requested this item be held.

4) <u>NEW BUSINESS CONTINUED:</u>

H. A prevention coalition contract for behavioral health services between the Regional Behavioral Health Authority (Region V) and Lancaster County on behalf of the Lincoln/Lancaster County Substance Abuse Coalition. Region V will pay the County \$140,400 to implement a Region V substance abuse prevention plan and to provide substance abuse prevention services through subcontractors. The term of the agreement is from July 1, 2009, through June 30, 2010. (C-09-0414)

MOTION: Schorr moved and Stevens seconded approval of the contract. Workman, Schorr, Stevens, Hudkins and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

I. A contract with Stock Auction Co., for surplus auction services. The County will pay commissions according to options 1, 2, and 3 of Attachment A of the contract. The term of the contract begins July 1, 2009, and ends June 30, 2010. (C-09-0415)

MOTION: Schorr moved and Workman seconded approval of the contract. Schorr, Stevens, Hudkins, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

J. An amendment to a grant contract, under County Contract No. C-07-0111, between Lancaster County and Voices of Hope to provide funding for the community-driven initiatives to address violence against women among diverse and traditionally under-served populations. The amendment changes the ending date of the grant contract from December 31, 2008, to December 31, 2009. The extension is within the federal grant ending date. (C-09-0416)

MOTION: Stevens moved and Workman seconded approval of the amendment. Stevens, Workman, Schorr, Hudkins and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

K. A mini-grant application and award through the Nebraska Office of Highway Safety, Department of Motor Vehicles for the Lancaster County Sheriff's Office for selective overtime enforcement in the "You Drink and Drive, You Lose" program, a statewide effort to reduce the number of impaired drivers during the holiday season. The County will set up and maintain a sobriety checkpoint over the Labor Day weekend in September, 2009. The overall focus is to increase the detection of impaired driving violations and other alcohol related violations. The funding assistance will provide reimbursement for overtime salaries. An estimated 100 hours of overtime compensation is requested for an approximate cost of \$4,400.

MOTION: Workman moved and Stevens seconded approval of the application. Workman, Schorr, Hudkins, Stevens and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

L. Acceptance of a grant award from the Nebraska Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice for the Skill and Asset Building in Juvenile Justice Grant. The County will receive \$30,000 of which \$15,000 is the County's match share. Term of the grant award is July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010.

MOTION: Stevens moved and Workman seconded to accept the grant award. Schorr, Hudkins, Stevens, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

M. Acceptance of a grant award from the Nebraska Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice for the Centralized Risk/Needs Assessment Project Grant. The County will receive \$65,555 of which \$9,177 is the County's match share. Term of the grant award is July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010.

MOTION: Workman moved and Stevens seconded to accept the grant award. Hudkins, Stevens, Schorr, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

N. Acceptance of a grant award from the Nebraska Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice for the Project Here to Overcome (H2O). The County will receive \$31,000 of which \$16,000 is the County's match share. Term of the grant award is July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010.

MOTION: Stevens moved and Workman seconded to accept the grant award. Hudkins, Stevens, Schorr, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

O. Acceptance of a grant award from the Nebraska Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice for the Lincoln Education and Academic Program (LEAP) Grant. The County will receive \$59,000 of which \$19,000 is the County's match share. Term of the grant award is July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010.

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Stevens seconded to accept the grant award. Schorr, Hudkins, Workman, Stevens and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

P. Acceptance of a grant award from the Nebraska Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice for the Building Our Assets Together (BOAT) Grant. The County will receive \$137,950 of which \$119,200 is the County's match share. Term of the grant award is July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010.

MOTION: Stevens moved and Hudkins seconded to accept the grant award. Workman, Schorr, Stevens, Hudkins and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

Q. Acceptance of a grant award from the Nebraska Crime Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice for the Sudanese Advocate Project Grant. The County will receive \$33,500 of which \$3,500 is the County's match share. Term of the grant award is July 1, 2009, to June 30, 2010.

MOTION: Stevens moved and Schorr seconded to accept the grant award. Schorr, Stevens, Hudkins, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

R. A Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality Construction Storm Water Notice of Intent for the new Lancaster County Adult Detention Facility.

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Stevens seconded approval of the Notice of Intent. Stevens, Workman, Schorr, Hudkins and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

S. A political subdivision tort claim filed against Lancaster County Corrections by Christopher Hutchinson for damaged property in the amount of \$200.

MOTION: Schorr moved and Hudkins seconded to deny the claim based upon the director's recommendation.

Hudkins noted the glasses were repaired, so there was no need to fix them twice.

ROLL CALL: Workman, Schorr, Hudkins, Stevens and Heier. Motion carried 5-0.

T. A political subdivision tort claim filed against Lancaster County Property Management by Judith Fargo for damaged property in an amount between \$607.21 and \$723.57.

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Stevens seconded to approve the claim using the low bid.

Heier noted this item was previously discussed at a staff meeting.

ROLL CALL: Schorr, Hudkins, Stevens, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

U. Appointment of Valerie R. McHargue as Deputy Public Defender at an annual salary of \$55,039, effective July 27, 2009.

MOTION: Stevens moved and Schorr seconded approval of the appointment. Hudkins, Stevens, Schorr, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

V. A memorandum of agreement with the Nebraska State Patrol (NSP) for reimbursement of overtime salary costs incurred by the Lancaster County Sheriff's Office in providing resources to assist the Nebraska State Patrol in investigation of non-compliant sex offenders. (C-09-0418)

Jeff Bliemeister, Sergeant for the County Sheriff's Office, explained the grant is sponsored by the Nebraska State Patrol sex offender registry. He said the Sheriff's office completed 161 compliance checks with six arrests for improper registration and nine arrests for outstanding warrants during their allotted 200 hours. This extension will run through September, 2010.

MOTION: Stevens moved and Hudkins seconded approval of the memorandum of agreement. Hudkins, Stevens, Schorr, Workman and Heier voted aye. Motion carried 5-0.

Mark Vasina, Treasurer of Nebraskans for Peace, spoke in support of maintaining Lancaster Manor as a County-owned facility. He presented a document on the budget with graphs on the operating surplus (Exhibit B) and discussed his analysis of the Manor.

Melvin Moore spoke about Lancaster Manor not being a preferred facility.

Kim Kaspar, American Federation of State, County & Municipal Employees (AFSCME), discussed the financial options of Lancaster Manor. She submitted a written request to the County Board for a meeting on Lancaster Manor (Exhibit C).

Heier asked Kaspar if the letter on the meeting request was shown to Gary Young, AFSCME attorney. Kaspar said he had not seen it yet.

MOTION: Hudkins moved to authorize the Chair, the Vice Chair, and a representative from the County Attorney's office to meet with AFSCME. Schorr seconded with the addition that the discussion be centered on cost-cutting measures without negotiations regarding employee benefits, wages and concessions.

Heier asked who would meet with the Board. Kaspar said it would probably be Gary Young, herself, and possibly Becky Simmerly.

Workman asked if Mr. Young was aware they were trying to set up a meeting. Kaspar said it had been discussed previously with him, and he was in support.

7) <u>EMERGENCY ITEMS AND OTHER BUSINESS CONTINUED:</u>

Heier stated he would not meet without the County's legal department speaking with Mr. Young. His preference was to discuss it further at a staff meeting.





THE LANCASTER MANOR BUDGET CRISIS August 3, 2009

County officials explain Lancaster Manor's \$3,500,000 deficit projection for fiscal year 2010 (ending June 30, 2010) as the inevitable wreckage of a noble but inefficient government-run enterprise roaring off the tracks, destined for financial ruin and carrying taxpayers with it.

However, the recent financial history of the county-owned nursing home reveals a very different story. Until 2009 the manor operated successfully—if not without bumps—and relied on taxpayer support only for temporary liquidity loans. After the Lancaster County Board announced, in early 2009, its intention to sell the manor, the ensuing publicity dramatically shook public confidence in the manor's future. Public concerns led to a sharp decline in the number of manor residents, resulting in falling revenues.

Between 2004 and 2008 the manor operated in a generally successful manner. Audits for those years reveal an average annual surplus (profit) of \$257,000. Operations for FY2008 (ended June 30, 2008) resulted in a surplus of \$544,408. Unfortunately, meaningful trend analysis using audit data is impossible, since results for individual months and years are driven by the irregularity of receivables collection and the modified cash-basis accounting used by the county.

Slow reimbursement for Medicaid and Medicare created cashflow problems starting in 2007, but were largely resolved by late 2008. This situation required occasional—sometimes large—transfers from the county General Fund (taxpayers) to cover expenses. But these loans—which functioned like a bank credit line—were always repaid. Nevertheless, the Board was forced to deal with issues at the manor for the first time in many years, and began to contemplate its sale.

Surprisingly, in July 2008—despite recurrent cashflow needs—the Board used \$2,000,000 in the manor's Renewal and Replacement Fund to retire its outstanding capital improvement bonds, issued in 1998. These bonds were retired—unnecessarily—five years before maturity, weakening the manor's cash reserves, forcing the delay of capital improvements, and damaging its ability to deal with current cashflow problems without taxpayer assistance.

Preliminary results for FY2009 (ended June 30, 2009) show the manor will report an operating deficit (loss) of over \$600,000, its weakest performance in recent years. County officials singled out March's \$256,000 deficit as the basis for the \$3,500,000 deficit projected for FY2010, although monthly results for FY2009 varied widely (as always) due to the county's accounting practices. The Request for Qualifications Report issued in June indicated, for example, a \$422,000 surplus for April. The report did, however, identify several critical unresolved problems, but nothing to suggest the manor is running deficits of \$300,000 per month, as claimed.


Officials underscore the decline in the manor resident census—averaging 239 for April-June 2009 despite a 293-bed capacity—as the primary reason for the disastrous budget outlook. However, the sharp census decline began only this year—the census averaged 253 for the last quarter of 2008—and coincides with publicity over the Board's latest talk of selling the manor. The decline reflects growing public concern over the manor's fate and the fate of current and potential residents. Ironically—and tragically—the budget crisis the Board now uses to rationalize the sale of the manor is the result of the public response to the Board's original decision to sell.

These observations support the position taken by county commissioner Larry Hudkins—a steadfast supporter of the manor—that census declines and rising deficits can be reversed only when the County Board acts to reestablish public confidence in the manor's future. It must abandon plans to sell Lancaster Manor and publicly embrace the manor's mission. Dumping the manor at this time betrays the public trust and makes our community considerably poorer.


