AGENDA ITEM

1 APPROVAL OF THE THURSDAY, MARCH 24, 2011 STAFF MEETING MINUTES

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Smoyer seconded approval of the March 24, 2011 Staff Meeting minutes. Smoyer, Hudkins and Schorr voted aye. Heier abstained from voting. Raybould was absent from voting. Motion carried 3-0, with one abstention.

2 ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Smoyer seconded approval of the additions to the agenda. Heier, Hudkins, Smoyer and Schorr voted aye. Raybould was absent from voting. Motion carried 4-0.

3 LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - Joe Kohout, Kissel/E&S Associates

Joe Kohout, Kissel/E&S Associates, presented a legislative update and Legislative bills of interest report.

Schorr said she contacted Senator Avery to urge support of LB 84 (Adopt the Build Nebraska Act and authorize bonds for the highway system) and was confused by a email he sent in response. She will forward the email to Kohout who will follow up with Senator Avery.

It was noted the Legislature's Business and Labor Committee advanced Commission on Industrial Relations (CIR) legislation to General File (see Exhibit A for a summary).

Kerry Eagan, Chief Administrative Officer, asked why the ability to pay is limited to school districts and community colleges in the legislation.

Kohout said the League of Municipalities indicated it did not want all political subdivisions included.

Eagan asked Kohout to check what position the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO) has taken.

ADDITIONS TO THE AGENDA

B. Potential for an Additional District Court Judge

Kohout said he has learned the Legislature's Judiciary Committee has discussed an additional district court judge for Lancaster County, noting an additional judgeship is required by State Statutes to go into effect July 1, 2011 unless the Legislature takes action to delay the date.

Schorr and Hudkins indicated they would like to see the judgeship delayed for at least a year. Hudkins also expressed concern regarding the lack of courtroom space.

Troy Hawk, Court Administrator, Lancaster County District Court, appeared and said there is a courtroom available for the new judge. A chamber is also set and partially furnished. He said the County will need to provide a bailiff for the judge, some additional furniture for the judge's chamber and computer equipment.

There was general consensus to lobby members of the Judiciary Committee for a delay.

Kohout said LB 251 (Change court fees) would likely be the “vehicle” for such a measure.

A. Management Team Agenda

The following agenda items were requested: 1) County vehicle fleet; 2) Budget update; and 3) Roundtable discussion.

Eagan noted there had been a question at the March 24th Staff Meeting regarding whether county employees are covered by the Political Subdivision Tort Claims Act and said they are if they are in the scope of county business.

C. Jail Population

Heier reported that the jail population is currently 559.

- 4 CORRECTIONS MEDICAL CONTRACT** - Rich Field, Director of Business Development, Correct Care Solutions (CCS); Dave Thomas, Regional Manager, CCS; Mike Thurber, Corrections Director; Brittany Behrens, Deputy County Attorney; Bob Walla, Assistant Purchasing Agent

Mike Thurber, Corrections Director, said a committee reviewed responses to the Request for Proposals (RFP) for inmate medical services and has recommended selection of Correct Care Solutions (CCS). **NOTE:** Members of the RFP Review Committee were Thurber; Kent Griffith, Lancaster Correctional Facility (LCF) Administrator; Terry Weber, Facility Administrator, Corrections; Brenda Fisher, Program Director, Corrections Department; Sheli Schindler, Youth Services Center (YSC) Director; Travis Parker, Community Mental Health Center (CMHC) Deputy Director; Dr. Cameron White, Nebraska Department of Corrections; Dennis Meyer, County Budget and Fiscal Officer; and Bob Walla, Assistant Purchasing Agent.

Rich Field, Director of Business Development, and Dave Thomas, Regional Manager, CCS, gave a profile of their company and discussed services they can provide to the County (Exhibit C).

In response to a question from Hudkins, Field said there will be no additional cost for contracting with their company, rather CCS will be working within the established budget. He said he believes they can reduce pharmaceutical costs and shift a portion of that allocation to staffing. **NOTE:** CCS plans to reduce the patient to staff ratio and will work to avoid having drugs provided that inmates cannot afford and won't have access to once they are released.

Schorr asked Settle, who was in attendance, whether there is an opportunity for partnership with CMHC.

Settle said CMHC would like to be involved in re-entry strategy and said Cornhusker Place (substance abuse treatment facility) has expressed interest in the substance abuse component.

Thomas said CCS is well aware of the mental health issues and plans to add mental health staff.

5 POTENTIAL LITIGATION - Mike Thew, Chief Deputy County Attorney

MOTION: Heier moved and Hudkins seconded to enter Executive Session at 9:26 a.m. for the purpose of protecting the public interest with regards to discussion of potential litigation. Heier, Smoyer, Hudkins and Schorr voted aye. Raybould was absent from voting. Motion carried 4-0.

Smoyer exited the meeting at 9:30 a.m. to represent the Board at the Mayor's press conference regarding the Sherman Field Forever Campaign.

MOTION: Heier moved and Hudkins seconded to exit Executive Session at 9:40 a.m. Heier, Hudkins and Schorr voted aye. Smoyer and Raybould were absent from voting. Motion carried 3-0.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER REPORT

A. County Board Intern

Gwen Thorpe, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer, said she followed up on information Commissioner Schorr had received about talentLNK, an internship program offered through the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce (see agenda packet). She said the programs focus is on professional internships and has not been extended to government at this time.

Schorr asked that discussion of internships be scheduled on a Management Team Meeting agenda.

B. County Government Month Press Release

It was noted a draft press release has been provided to Board members.

No action was taken.

C. County Board of Equalization Workshop (May 26, 2011)

There was general consensus to schedule a training session on Board of Equalization matters on a future Staff Meeting agenda.

- 6 ABBOTT SPORTS COMPLEX MOTOCROSS AGREEMENT** - Glenn Johnson, Lower Platte South Natural Resources District (NRD) General Manager; Ariana Kennedy, Lower Platte South NRD; Steven Seglin, Attorney for Lower Platte South NRD; Brittany Behrens, Deputy County Attorney; Brian Clark and Dan Soltys; Co-Executive Directors of the Abbott Sports Complex

Glenn Johnson, Lower Platte South Natural Resources District (NRD) General Manager, said work on the cooperative agreement between Lancaster County, Lower Platte South NRD and the Abbott Motocross, LLC (limited liability company) for the Abbott Motocross Track and the facility operation plan is nearly complete. He noted one of the conditions for funding from the State-sponsored Recreational Trails Program was that operation continue for 20 years. Johnson said the Lower Platte South NRD holds a 20-year easement over the property and said the primary role of the County will be to conduct an annual review of the operating plan and finances.

It was noted the facility will be open to the public and closed for special races and other competitive events.

Dan Soltys; Co-Executive Director of the Abbott Sports Complex, said races have been scheduled for May 22nd, July 3rd and August 17th.

Schorr inquired about the opening date and ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Brian Clark, Co-Executive Director of the Abbott Sports Complex, said he anticipates it will be the first part of May.

Eagan said there may be improvements to the facility in the future that would be suitable for funding with Visitors Improvement Fund dollars.

Board consensus was to schedule a special presentation regarding the agreement and facility on a regular County Board of Commissioners Meeting agenda.

- 7 SOUTHEAST NEBRASKA DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT (SENDD)** - David Talady, Executive Director, SENDD; Craig Eberle, Loan Officer, SENDD; Dennis Meyer, County Budget and Fiscal Officer; Mike Lang, Administrative Assistant to the Mayor, Economic Development

Dennis Meyer, Budget and Fiscal Officer, noted the Nebraska Department of Economic Development (NDED) has asked the County to return Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program income funds because they are not being used. He said the City's Urban Development Department is no longer managing the funds for the County and said he had asked Mike Lang, Administrative Assistant to the Mayor, Economic Development, whether there was some other organization that could assist the County with projects.

Lang said he contacted the Southeast Nebraska Development District (SENDD), a multi-county economic development organization authorized by the U.S. Department of Commerce-Economic Development Administration, to see if they would be interested in working with Lancaster County. **NOTE:** Lancaster County is located within SENDD's region.

David Talady, Executive Director, SENDD, discussed his organization's services and programs. He explained that the County could either apply for membership, including municipalities through agreements, or contract with SENDD for services on a case-by-case basis.

Lang noted NDED has implemented a two-year rule that applies to all counties and municipalities that have CDBG funds. The two-year period restarts once a project is engaged. He said he recently learned that Prairieland Dairy would like to expand its production facility in Hallam, Nebraska which could be a suitable project for funding.

Hudkins inquired about membership fees.

Craig Eberle, Loan Officer, SENDD, agreed to forward the information to the Board.

Schorr asked whether the County could pay membership fees out of the CDBG program income funds.

Talady said it can. He suggested the County begin by contracting for services and work towards membership.

MOTION: Hudkins moved and Heier seconded to direct the County Attorney's Office, in coordination with Kerry Eagan, Chief Administrative Officer; Dennis Meyer, County Budget and Fiscal Officer; and Mike Lang, Administrative Assistant to the Mayor, Economic Development, to work on development of a contract with the Southeast Nebraska Development District (SENDD) for administration of the County's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program income funds. Hudkins, Heier and Schorr voted aye. Smoyer and Raybould were absent from voting. Motion carried 3-0.

8 PENSION REVIEW COMMITTEE (PRC) RECOMMENDATION FOR REPLACEMENT OF MID CAP GROWTH FUND - Kerry Eagan and Doug Cyr, Members of the Pension Review Committee (PRC)

Eagan reported the following recommendation from the Pension Review Committee (PRC) regarding the Lancaster County, Nebraska Employees Retirement Plan and the Lancaster County, Nebraska 457 Deferred Compensation Plan:

The American Century Vista IM Fund should be replaced with the Eaton Vance Atlanta Capital SMID-Cap Fund, subject to review by Segal Advisors (Pension Plan Consultant).

Doug Cyr, Chief Administrative Deputy County Attorney and a member of the PRC, said the Eaton Vance Atlanta Capital SMID-Cap Fund is rated a 5 Star Fund under the Morningstar stock rating system. The fund is also projected to have higher returns with lower risk than the other fund options the PRC was provided.

9 TEMPORARY SIGNS IN COUNTY RIGHT-OF-WAY NEAR SUNRISE ESTATES ADDITION, 95TH AND HOLDREGE STREETS - Ken Schroeder, County Surveyor; Brittany Behrens, Deputy County Attorney

Ken Schroeder, County Surveyor, presented photographs and a site plan showing the location of temporary signs the developer of the Waterford Estates subdivision placed in the County's right-of-way to direct construction traffic.

Danay Kalkowski, attorney for the Waterford Estates developer, appeared and said her client stated that construction traffic was to use the 98th Street entrance in its covenants and lot purchase agreements. The developer recently received a complaint from the Sunrise Estates Neighborhood Association, the adjacent subdivision, regarding construction traffic and the engineer for the Waterford Estates project put the signs up to address those concerns.

Schroeder said the signs are well off the road and don't appear to pose a problem.

Brittany Behrens, Deputy County, said the Board could either ask the developer to remove the signs or pass a resolution authorizing location of the signs in the County's right-of-way.

Eagan said Joe Kelly, County Attorney, has indicated that Brittany Behrens, Deputy County Attorney, may serve on the committee.

Schorr said the County Clerk's Office has offered to staff the meetings.

E. Prudential Dedicated Retirement Counselor

Eagan said Ryan Sullivan, the County's Dedicated Retirement Counselor, has given his notice to Prudential.

Board consensus was to request that Prudential assign someone else to the position, with input from the County.

MOTION: Heier moved and Hudkins seconded to enter Executive Session at 10:43 a.m. for the purpose of protecting the public interest with regards to discussion of labor negotiations and potential litigation. Hudkins, Heier and Schorr voted aye. Smoyer and Raybould were absent from voting. Motion carried 4-0.

Smoyer returned to the meeting at 11:00 a.m.

MOTION: Heier moved and Hudkins seconded to exit Executive Session at 11:13 a.m. Hudkins, Heier, Smoyer and Schorr voted aye. Raybould was absent from voting. Motion carried 4-0.

DISCUSSION OF BOARD MEMBER MEETINGS

B. Lancaster County Correctional Facility Joint Public Agency (JPA)
Meeting - Schorr, Heier

Schorr said they approved claims totaling \$2,223,331.84. The claims reflected payments to Wells Fargo for bank fees, Sampson Construction Company, the construction manager at risk, and The Clark Enersen Partners, the architect.

RETURNING TO ITEM 2C

Heier said he has provided a report to each of the commissioners detailing the offenses of inmates currently housed in the jail. He said he wants the commissioners to review the report and be prepared to discuss which offenses they deem appropriate for placement in Community Corrections programs at the April 7th Staff Meeting. Heier said he wants commissioners to pay particular attention to the number of times some offenders have been booked into the facility.

The Board will also designate its representative to the Justice Council at the April 7th Staff Meeting.

12 BUDGET UPDATE AND GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEM (GIS) DISCUSSION - Dennis Meyer, County Budget and Fiscal Officer

Budget Discussion

Dennis Meyer, County Budget and Fiscal Officer, noted the County entered into an interlocal agreement with the State of Nebraska Probation Administration in 2008 for two probation officers to provide additional pre-sentence investigation report services to decrease the time needed to complete pre-sentence investigations of inmates housed by the Lancaster County Corrections Department. He said the agreement has expired and a new contract is needed in order to pay State Probation for services they have provided to the County this year. Meyer noted the amount of time it is taking to complete pre-sentence investigations is still more lengthy than the County would like.

Board consensus was to schedule further discussion of this issue with Mike Thurber, Corrections Director, and Gene Cotter, Chief Probation Officer, Adult Probation.

Meyer said Don Killeen, County Property Manager, has informed him there will be reductions in rent in the buildings outside the government complex. He said there will also be a slight reduction in security costs for the Justice and Law Enforcement Center.

Schorr noted it had been suggested that the Board consider possible reductions to the following General Fund budget items:

- \$6,000 paid to the Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department for illegal dumping signs and billboards
- \$15,000 paid to the City for the County's share of the Equal Employment Officer position
- \$4,600 paid to 5-City TV to air County Board, Lancaster County Correctional Facility Joint Public Agency (JPA) and City-County Common Meetings
- \$15,000 for membership in the Nebraska Association of County Officials (NACO) and National Association of County Officials (NACo)
- \$1,000 for the Management Team Retreat
- \$10,000 for the Employee Recognition Breakfast & Awards Ceremony
- \$1,200 for the Tri-County Retreat

Schorr said she favors eliminating funding of the first two items. She said she believes the Board needs to continue airing its meetings on 5-City TV but believes the City-County Common should discuss whether it wants to continue airing its meetings. Schorr felt the Board should continue its membership in NACO and NACo, noting county residents have saved over \$150,000 a year through NACO's Prescription Discount Card Program. She said she believes the cost of the Management Team Retreat could be reduced by holding it in the County-City Building and reducing the food costs but said it would be difficult to eliminate Tri-County Meeting costs this year since it is Lancaster County's turn to host the meeting. Schorr also noted that the County has incurred costs for the Board to hold periodic meetings with representatives of the County's cities villages and suggested those meetings be held in the other communities, on a rotating basis, instead.

Geographic Information System (GIS) Discussion

Present for the discussion were Jeff McReynolds, GIS Program Manager; Steve Henderson, Information Services (IS) Manager; Don Thomas, County Engineer; Ken Schroeder, County Surveyor; Erik Hubl, GIS Mapping Division Head, County Engineering; Norm Agena, County Assessor/Register of Deeds; Rob Ogden, Chief Field Deputy Assessor/Register of Deeds; and Doug Guess, Computer and GIS Supervisor, County Assessor/Register of Deeds Office.

Meyer noted that there was a new \$85,000 line item in the Board's IS budget this year for GIS costs.

Steve Henderson, Information Services (IS) Manager, said there is a growing list of GIS activities that requires operational assistance to accomplish. He said his department is prepared to assist with that operational activity by increasing its allocation of staff time for GIS technical tasks from a .5 FTE (full-time equivalent) to a

1.5 FTE. Henderson said the cost will be split between the City and County on a 60/40 basis. He said the County's share is the \$85,000 that Meyer referenced.

Jeff McReynolds, GIS Program Manager, said his salary is split among the seven members of the GIS Administration Team: Planning Department, County Engineer, County Assessor/Register of Deeds, City Building and Safety Department, City Public Works/Utilities, Lincoln Electric System (LES) and the Lower Platte South Natural Resources District (NRD). He said he is responsible for coordination of those entities' GIS efforts and agreed there is a need for technical capabilities (back-end server maintenance, database, website development). McReynolds explained that the departments update their data but should not be responsible for the dispersion of the data (enterprise effort).

In response to a question from Schorr, Henderson said it is a reassignment of duties, not a new hire.

Hudkins asked whether there will be a reduction in the IS budget to reflect the new revenues.

Henderson explained that the revenues will basically be even because other work has been completed or does not require as much of a time commitment.

Schorr noted GIS applications have spread throughout government and asked whether it is time to readjust the billings.

McReynolds said a GIS budget has been created with the intent of spreading costs out to all the users. **NOTE:** Some of the departments mentioned were Emergency Management, County Sheriff, Lincoln Police Department (LPD), Lincoln Fire & Rescue and the Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department.

Schorr asked whether a system could be set up to track usage.

Henderson said it could.

Hudkins asked the department heads in attendance whether service has been adequate.

Don Thomas, County Engineer, and Ken Schroeder, County Surveyor, said they feel it has been.

Rob Ogden, Chief Field Deputy Assessor/Register of Deeds, disagreed. He cited a three month delay in getting new aerial photographs implemented into the system and delays in getting updates applied to their website because there wasn't anyone

available to do the work at IS. Ogden said the delays also affects professionals that utilize their data, such as realtors, brokers, appraisers and title companies.

McReynolds said it is difficult for him to allocate staff from multiple departments to do enterprise projects.

Ogden said he believes it is more appropriate to move McReynolds to IS.

Thomas disagreed, citing past experience with the IS Department.

Smoyer asked whether there would be cost savings by "piggybacking" on the State for GIS services.

Henderson said the State has a nine-member Commission named the Nebraska Information Technology Commission. One of its supporting groups is the GIS Council which is working to establish operational and policy level direction for GIS at the State. He said the GIS Council is struggling with some of the same issues as the County (data creation, data management, operational support for GIS). Henderson said he previously served as Chair of the GIS Council and McReynolds now serves as Co-Chair, as a local representative.

McReynolds said in his opinion the County is far ahead of the State.

Smoyer inquired about an internship with the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) Computer Science Department.

Henderson said the work is complex and the students would graduate by the time they could contribute effectively.

Norm Agena, County Assessor/Register of Deeds, said he has pulled his department's share of McReynolds' salary and benefits (\$19,655) from the budget and Ogden has resigned from the group because they believe it has been ineffective.

Schorr asked Thomas whether he plans to do the same.

Thomas said he does not.

Agena said he still plans to contribute to the aerial and Light Detection and Ramping (LIDAR) photography.

Schorr suggested the Board look at funding a portion of the GIS costs through the Keno Fund as a one-year pilot project while a broader approach to allocation of costs is developed.

Meyer suggested the Board should weigh the funding proposal with other potential Keno Fund projects.



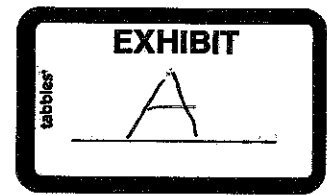

Legislative Update

March 31, 2011

Today is the fifty-sixth day of the ninety day session.

This past week has seen a tremendous amount of activity in county related issues. First, since last weeks' meeting, LB84 was advanced by the Legislature to Select File. As you will recall, LB84 is the roads funding bill that includes approximately \$10 Million per year to assist Nebraska counties with road construction. Due to a filibuster, the bill was moved by the Legislature following a cloture motion and adoption of the Revenue Committee amendment. None of the amendments we discussed at last weeks' staff meeting were adopted. There were 36 votes in favor of the cloture motion and 32 votes to advance. Discussions continue regarding amendments to eliminate the bonding; to lower the amount generated to .25; and to change the amounts of the gas tax. While the amount of votes was sufficient to get it past the first level of debate, the votes will need to hold.

The Business and Labor Committee advanced the CIR legislation to General File. This was done following what Senator Lathrop identified as months of negotiations. We have attached a summary of the amendment with this report for your review. This legislation appears to have the support of leading members of the Legislature and will likely be debated next week or the week after.

Senator Scott Lautenbaugh was successful in amending LB⁶²⁸~~630~~ to include the provisions from LB139 which would allow for the county board may authorize a county official to sell surplus property, including mobile equipment, that is obsolete or unusable. At the hearing, Commissioner Smoyer and Bill Jarrett testified in support. The bill advanced to Select File.

LB 397 AMENDMENT SUMMARY

Municipalities, Counties, Utilities, and non-certificated school and community college employees:

Array:

- 70% job match
- preference for geographically proximate and Nebraska public and private employers
- 7-13 array size, but can be as few as 5 if all Nebraska employers and does not have to be balanced with public, private, large, small or Nebraska/out-state employers
- only one public employer in a MSA can be used
- for utilities: if subject employer has a nuclear plant, at least 4 array members must have nuclear plant; array members must perform similar functions as subject employer (generation, transmission, distribution); CIR will use 50 mile concentric circles to reach optimum array

Comparability:

- public and private presumed to provide same or similar conditions unless evidence shows dissimilar
- no more than double no less than half presumed to provide same or similar conditions unless shown to be dissimilar
- MSA must also meet size criteria
- public employers not in a MSA cannot be compared to employers in a MSA
- prevalence: current practices will continue including using the midpoint for numeric values and mode for non-numeric. All array members regardless if they provide the benefit will be included (zeros count both ways)
- HRV: CIR will use HRV to value defined benefit and contribution plans and health plans. (HRV=hourly rate value)
- economic variable: CIR may consider if evidence is presented

Procedure:

- rules of evidence do not apply in wage cases
- mootness: CIR is required to value every economic item even if the year in question has expired.
- orders will be retroactive to the beginning of the year in dispute. Decreases are limited to new hires, voluntary transfers, or demoted employees. Otherwise, wages are frozen until below comparability
- staffing concerning safety issues is mandatory bargaining subject, other staffing issues are permissive

Schools and Community Colleges w/certificated employees:

- creates negotiation time-line and mandatory mediation (unless both parties choose to forgo). Negotiations must begin by November 1. If a party is not satisfied with the resolution officer's decision or if there is no agreement by March 25, a party may file a petition with the CIR. The CIR must issue a decision by September 15.
- ability to pay: employer may request an additional hearing to argue an inability to pay.
- financial incentives for shortage areas and underachieving schools will be negotiated
- allows schools to grant permanent status before the end of the 3 year probationary period for exemplary performance

State Employees (basically the same as LB 555)

- removes the special master and requires cases tried to the CIR
- appeals are to the Supreme Court
- CIR must consider: wages for time actually worked and not worked, benefits; geographic proximity, size of employer (no more than double no less than half); and budget for operations and personnel.
- Rules of evidence does not apply in wage cases

Introduction

Attached are your monthly files. Below is a summary of the December activity which concludes the second year of our contract. Thank you for allowing CCS to be of service to you for these two past years!

Overview

Actual operating expenses were \$2,736 under December's budget and for the YTD were \$27,754 under budget. The largest under budget item this month was Off-Site expense at \$6,343 under budget and the largest under budget category for the contract YTD was other expenses at \$22,993 under budget. The largest over budget item for December and for the contract YTD was pharmacy expense at \$4,819 over budget and \$36,652 over budget, respectively. Please see additional discussion below by each significant area of focus.

Personnel Costs

Personnel costs were over budget by \$1,320 this month and under budget \$20,305 for the contract YTD. With respect to FTEs for the month of December, total FTEs were 18.06, 0.31 over the 17.75 contracted FTEs. The largest over contracted staffing variance for December was RNs at 0.85 FTEs over the contracted staffing. This variance was primarily due to RNs covering shift vacancies while two LPNs are on FMLA. The largest under contracted staffing variance for December was LPNs at 0.78 under the contracted staffing. For the contract YTD, total FTEs were 18.48. This is 0.73 FTEs higher than the contracted amount of 17.75. The largest over contract YTD variance was LPNs at 0.39 and the largest under contract variance was CMAs at 0.04.

Off-Site

Per the December off-site report, a total of \$4,770 of off-site expense was incurred for the month, which consisted of 1 hospital day, 1 emergency room visit, 5 office visits, and 1 radiology event. As you will note on the attached "Actual vs. Budgeted Expense Statement" for December, the total expense shown was \$11,252. An adjustment was made to update prior month accruals to the actual payments made, which resulted in a charge of \$6,482 to the County. This adjustment was primarily a result of payments on two hospitalizations that were in excess of the estimated costs. Despite the adjustment, December off-site expense was under budget by \$6,343. For the contract YTD, off-site expense was \$7,494 under budget, which is primarily due to several months without dialysis events and low hospital days during January through June.

Pharmacy

Pharmacy expense for December was \$10,768, which was slightly higher than the contract YTD average of \$9,086 per month. Contract YTD expense equaled \$109,031 and was \$36,652 over budget. For the month of December (gross of credits), HIV meds represent approximately 48% and psychotropic meds represent approximately 17% of total pharmacy expense. For the contract YTD (gross of credits), HIV meds represent approximately 42% and psychotropic meds 25% of total pharmacy expense. The December and YTD budget variances were primarily a result of an increase in use of purchased HIV meds rather than home meds as in the prior year.

Benefits and All Other Costs

Total other expense including benefits was \$2,531 under budget for December and \$36,606 under budget YTD. The largest under budget category for December was other expenses at \$1,701 under budget. The largest over budget category for December was supplies at \$2,194 over budget. The largest under budget category YTD was other expenses at \$22,993 under budget, which was primarily a result of lower than expected recruiting costs, which were approximately \$18,000 under budget YTD. The largest over budget category YTD was employee benefits at \$5,931 over budget.
