A. Population Comments

During the department's 1st quarter of 2012, the average daily population increased by 2.5% over the same quarter of 2011. Total number of inmates lodged during this quarter have increased by 3.6%. These increases usually result in our out-of-county population to increase. Out-of-county housing did increase by seven more individuals per day being housed outside Lancaster County. We averaged 73 inmates per day out-of-county.

A total of 37 inmates were released during these last 3 months to Mental Health Jail Diversion, Post Arraignment Release and the Sentence Conversion Program.

B. Population Graph (see attached) Appendix 1

The population graph shows the month to month populations for FY11 and FY12. This graph shows the facility's rated capacity as of 1991 when the Adult Detention Facility opened.

C. Monthly Statistical Report (see attached) Appendix 2 & 3-FY11, FY12

This is a statistical report giving the average daily population for both facilities, number of bookings, types of arrests and releases, as well as medical and mental health services provided.

III. DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES

A. TRAINING

In the period from January 1st through March 31st, 2012, the training division handled approximately 382 applications for Correctional Officer positions. Orientation training was provided for eight new full-time officers and one nurse.

An In-Service training class was conducted in CPR/AED and First Aid. This class was attended by all uniform staff, nurses and many administrative and support staff.

Twelve officers attended the Officer's Training Academy, which is an 80 hour training course intended for officers who have been with the department for approximately 3 to 6 months.

Lt. Anderson attended the Nebraska Correctional Association Conference in Kearney. Lt. Anderson has also been involved in a committee writing policies for the new facility.

B. MENTAL HEALTH JAIL DIVERSION PROJECT

During this quarter, eleven inmates were admitted into the project. Four were in custody at the time they were accepted into the program. Of these eleven, seven were also under Community Corrections supervision and one was a probation referral. One of these seven individuals, successfully completed her time with Community Corrections in March but remains in the Mental Health Diversion Project.

Six inmates were also terminated from the program from January-March, 2012. All six of these inmates were under the supervision of Community Corrections. Of these six individuals, four have returned to jail custody and the other two have active warrants.

C. OUT OF COUNTY HOUSING

Lancaster County continues to house inmates in Platte, Butler, Saunders, Saline and Dawson counties due to overcrowding. During the months of January-March, 2012, we maintained an average population of 9.9 inmates in Platte County. During this same time period, nine round trips were made, moving 51 inmates between the two facilities.

Butler County's average population for this time period was 16.2 with 59inmates moved between the two facilities and 6 round trips.

Saunders County's average population for this period was 9.8 with 49 inmates moved between the two facilities..

Saline County's average population for this period was 18.3 with 94 inmates moved between the two facilities.

Dawson County's average population from January-March, 2012 was 19.4 with 97 inmates moved between the two facilities.

In addition, the transport division transported 2,865 inmates to court, medical appointments or other locations. This required approximately 1,042 staff hours to complete.

D. LCF & WORK CREW ACTIVITIES

During the January-March, 2012 quarter, work crews have been busy doing routine maintenance including painting at both facilities and preparing air handlers for the spring/summer months.

E. PROGRAMS DIVISION

Correct Care Solutions' mental health practitioners coordinated an average of 50 evaluations per month with their psychiatrist during January, February and March 2012. An average of two inmates per month were placed into Emergency Protective Custody and transferred with a jail hold to the Crisis Center, due to meeting the criteria of mental illness and dangerousness to oneself or others. Mental health practitioners had an average of 617 contacts with inmates each month during this quarter, in which mental health, personal problems, or coping with confinement concerns were addressed.

Correctional Specialists and the Chaplain coordinated an average of 190 educational, self-help, and religious programs per month January- March 2012. This number represents programs offered at the Intake & Detention Facility and Lancaster Correctional Facility in airpark.

The Work Release Coordinator reviewed an average of 148 court ordered release applications per month. This number reflects both District and County Court applications. The average number of individuals on work release this quarter was 31.

F. TRANSITION ACTIVITIES

The transition team has continued work on many aspects of this project. The records committee has worked with Records and Information Management, Information Services and County Court to stream line our processes by switching many of our forms into a digital format.


The staff and inmate furniture purchases have been finalized. The radio design was just recently completed and is being reviewed by our staff and the County/City radio shop. This should go out for bid soon.

The transition team and Information Services have continued to work on developing a hand held safety and security scanner that will be directly tied to our inmate management system. We are hoping to take advantage of RFID technology and our WIFI system to track inmate movement, officer safety checks and many other functions.

The storage RFP was finalized and opened for bids. We only had one vender's bid successfully submitted. Due to budgetary constraints that bid was rejected and the RFP has been re-opened.


Numerous committees continue to work on scenarios. Policies are being developed based on these scenarios and post order development will start soon.



2 POPULATION STATISTICS

A. Population Comments

Mike Thurber, Corrections Director, said there was 2.3% growth in overall population this quarter, compared to the same period in 2011.

Thurber noted 73 inmates were housed out-of-county which represents an increase likely due to holiday coverage. He said today's number is around 100. It was noted as the local population drops, inmates will be transferred back to Lincoln.

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Thurber said 37 individuals were released this quarter to the Mental Health Jail Diversion Program, Pre-Trial Diversion and Community Correction's Sentenced Conversion Program.

3 DEPARTMENT ACTIVITIES

A. Training

CPR/AED training was performed this quarter. Thurber said approximately 382 applications for Correctional Officer positions were received. Orientation training was provided for a new nurse and eight new full-time officers and 12 officers attended the Officer's Training Academy.

B. Mental Health Jail Diversion Program

Thurber said eleven individuals were accepted into the Mental Health Jail Diversion Program this quarter, four were in custody at the time. Seven of the eleven were under Community Corrections supervision and one was a probation referral. Six inmates were terminated from the program this quarter all of which were under the supervision of Community Corrections. Four have returned to jail custody and the other two have active warrants.

C. Out-of-County Housing

Inmates continue to be housed in Butler, Dawson, Platte, Saline and Saunders Counties, due to overcrowding. Thurber said it took approximately 1,042 staff hours to transport inmates to court, medical appointments and other locations this quarter.

D. Lancaster Correctional Facility (LCF)/Work Crew Activities

Thurber said work crews have been painting at both facilities and preparing air handlers for the spring/summer months.

E. Programs Division

Thurber said Correct Care Solutions (CCS) mental health practitioners coordinated an average of 50 mental health evaluations per month with their psychiatrist. Mental

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health practitioners had an average of 617 monthly contacts with inmates. An average of two inmates per month were placed into emergency protective custody (EPC).

The Work Release Coordinator reviewed an average of 148 court-ordered applications per month. The average number of individuals on work release was 31.

F. Transition Activities

Thurber said staff is working with Records Management to streamline the transfer of data to the courts. Eventually, the goal is to be paperless. Work is also being done in conjunction with the radio shop on a bid for wireless radio technology.

Hand-held safety and security scanning technology is also being researched. This would tie into the existing inmate management system. Thurber said the price has really declined in the past five years (roughly \$30 per 1000 bracelets).

Staff is working diligently on policies and procedures and scenario development.

Thurber said they are working with the Lancaster County Correctional Facility Joint Public Agency (JPA) regarding the warehouse. Also, the furniture contract has been finalized and should be before the County Board next week.

Schorr questioned the storage RFP and whether it is necessary to rebid it at this time. Thurber said the lone bid was rejected due to cost. He added this shelving is incorporated throughout the building in areas such as the mailroom, maintenance, records storage, laundry, property room, etc.
